Although 2021 was still marred by the lingering effects of Covid-19, the Society and its Board of Directors have worked hard to maintain a strong, visible, presence in Orange County and to implement improved ways to engage Society members and the public at large. I also would like to offer my biggest thanks to our research center staff who allow us to operate and provide our services to the interested public (mostly free of charge). The efforts and dedication of Jean McGann, Jayne Blair, and Ruth Mallory Long have not gone unnoticed or unappreciated.

During 2021, the Society undertook a number of beneficial projects. These include the repair of the four front porch columns at the research center and the printing of an updated membership brochure. We have inaugurated a program to assist public school teachers in Orange County, providing them with complimentary memberships and web-based resources to supplement their teaching of Virginia history. We have also partnered with the Orange County Department of Planning to have them scan our collection of 1937 aerial maps of the county at high resolution.
